Success in localizing WASH Initiatives

The Community-led Inclusive Climate Resilient (CLICR) WASH project is a prime example of how EMW's localized approach can create lasting change. By building local capacities and fostering community-led initiatives, EMW engaged government bodies from the provincial to commune level, private sector partners, suppliers, and community groups. This collaboration ensured that households gained access to clean water and sanitation, while also integrating climate change adaptation knowledge and practical actions.

The project's success was rooted in strong procedures and structures, focusing on empowering both our staff and the communities we serve. Active participation and financial contributions from various stakeholders, including government and private sectors, were vital in connecting households to essential WASH services. This engagement highlighted the profound impact of a localized approach in achieving sustainable development goals, demonstrating how empowering communities leads to long-term, meaningful change.

Kakrona's journey with EMW began as a dedicated volunteer in the Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) department, where her innovative approaches and commitment quickly earned her recognition. In 2023, she stepped into a crucial role in the M&E section of the CLICR WASH project, taking on responsibilities that extended far beyond her primary duties.

Kakrona actively supported project activities and participated in field visits, where she experienced the profound impact of her work-witnessing communities gain essential knowledge and access to clean water and sanitation. One of her most rewarding experiences was leading community training sessions, particularly on menstrual hygiene management (MHH), where she addressed significant gaps in local understanding.

Kakrona's work truly embodies the power of a localized approach, seamlessly bridging the gap between project implementation and community engagement and fostering sustainable development from within. Her dedication serves as an inspiration, demonstrating how empowering local leaders can create meaningful and lasting change.

In addition to providing clean water access, the WOBA project also organized school hygiene training for primary students and delivered education on hygiene behavior change (HBC), gender equality, and the rights of people living with disabilities.









2023, EMWF Laos successfully completed phase 3 of our Women-Output Based Aid (WOBA) project, handing over four water supply systems in Luang Prabang, Xayabury, Luang Namtha provinces, and Vientiane Capital. Through the implementation of the Private Partnership (PPP) model and a focus on women-led initiatives, we empowered local communities to make critical choices about using clean water and practicing good hygiene for better health. This approach not only strengthened the capacity of private water suppliers authorities local but also and created sustainable impacts, significantly improving the quality of life for the community.

Apply Public-Private Partnership (PPP) model for sustainable impact

In 2023, Khouankeo Ardphasouk, the Country Director and WASH Program Manager of EMW Laos, directed a transformative shift towards localization within the East Meets West Foundation. He believed that by prioritizing the empowerment of local talents and investing in community resilience, the foundation achieved significant strides in creating sustainable impacts.

One of the standout success stories came from Luang Prabang province, where local authorities at the provincial, district, and commune levels led a water sanitation campaign that greatly improved the community's access to clean water. Their deep understanding of local customs and language facilitated stronger community participation, making the project a resounding success. This initiative not only enhanced the community health but also empowered local employees to take on greater responsibilities, demonstrating the strength of localized leadership.

Phonesavanh Panthala, known as Touk, is a vital member of EMW Laos. As the Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) and Accounting and Finance (A&F) Officer, Touk has shown exceptional dedication and talent in her work.

In 2023, Touk and her team successfully completed phase 3 of the WOBA project in Laos, particularly the Chomphet water supply station in Luang Prabang Province. Through EMW, she gained essential skills in English, communication, accounting, and finance, while also developing a deep understanding of multicultural environments.

> Touk's approach, rooted in cultural sensitivity and local knowledge in Laos, fostered trust and active participation from the community in clean water project activities. Beyond office work, Touk and her team engaged the local community, empowering local women to take on leadership roles within their communities.



2023 Achievements and Impact

In 2023, EMWF efforts in Vietnam centered on empowering local talents and communities. As a valued stakeholder in the Asia Young Leaders Program, EMWF hosted two study tours in Hoa Binh province and a final forum in Hanoi for 25 participants. These events engaged donors and local partners, providing profound experiential learning opportunities by sharing expertise and insights into neonatal care in Vietnam.





EMWF also engaged in the Vietnam Youth Development Project, collaborating with donors to design and execute the program. Participants, including 30 highpotential students, shared the same experiences, contributing significantly to the program's functioning. This project aimed to empower these students by improving their leadership capabilities, enabling them to drive positive changes in their communities.

Nurturing Future Leaders

In 2023, Mr. Hiep Nguyen, EMW Vietnam Representative and Deputy Country Director, placed a strong emphasis on nurturing future leaders through the Asia Young Leaders Program and the Vietnam Youth Development Project. Leveraging EMW's extensive experience in areas such as WASH, building healthy cities, and fostering resilient communities, we have established a reputation that has earned the trust of donors and stakeholders. This credibility helped us form valuable partnerships for both the Asia Leaders Program and the Vietnam Youth Development Project.

These initiatives aimed to empower high-potential students by enhancing their leadership capabilities, enabling them to drive positive change within their communities. Participants gained insightful experiential learning opportunities, including shared expertise in areas like neonatal care. The success of these 2023 projects demonstrated that investing in local talents not only cultivates future leadership but also fosters sustainable community development for the long term.




