Message from the Executive Director

2024-2025 was a year of deep reflection and sharpened focus for Thrive Networks/East Meets West (EMW).



The nonprofit community has felt deep uncertainty — highlighted by the dissolution of USAID — creating shifts and urgency for sustainability across our sector. In response, EMW chose focus. We doubled down on what we do best: delivering high-quality, locally-led WASH+ solutions, empowering women and youth leaders, and strengthening the systems that sustain communities long after projects close.

Across our programs in Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam, we saw incredible resilience. Private water operators extended pipelines to underserved villages. Commune councils and Women's Unions led sanitation campaigns. Students built STEM skills and confidence. Families moved into climate-resilient homes designed to withstand environmental risk.

In 2026, we will continue to invest in community leadership, expand public-private partnerships, and deepen our evidence-based approach while navigating the evolving funding landscape through these priorities:

- Scale WASH+ nationwide models and blended finance pathways
- Expand gender leadership, youth empowerment, and STEM learning platforms
- Strengthen climate-resilient housing and safe school programs
- Mobilize diverse and flexible funding to sustain local talent and systems

Our future is rooted in local leadership, climate resilience, and dignity for all.

STANDS THROUGH STORMS

For more than a decade, Mrs. Huong family lived in a half-finished house that could not withstand the storms and floods frequently hitting Thang Binh District, Quang Nam Province in Central Vietnam. Each rainy season brought new fears — strong winds blew away their roof, and floodwaters sometimes rose to one meter, forcing the family to shelter in the old, unsafe part of the house.

With unstable income due to Mrs. Huong's husband health condition and Mrs. Huong's limited ability to do heavy work, the family had no means to repair or rebuild their home. Their 15-year-old son left school after Grade 9, and their youngest daughter, only five, grew up in an environment where safety was never guaranteed.

Through EMWF's climate-resilient compassion homes programs — combined with contributions from the local government and the family's relatives — a new 50 m² storm-resistant home was completed. The new house provides a safe upper-floor shelter during floods, reinforced walls, and a secure roof designed to endure severe weather.

Mrs. Huong is one of more than 600 families who have benefited from EMWF's "Climate Resilient Compassionate Homes" program over the years — each home providing safety, dignity, and resilience for vulnerable families.

On October 14, 2024, the family received their new home - a foundation of safety, dignity, and resilience for the years ahead.



NEW HOPE FOR US

CLEAN WATER



Every day, she walked 1 km to fetch water from the Yang River three times, carrying heavy buckets of murky water and spending up to three hours daily. Bottled water added an extra cost of 3-4 \$ per month.

With her husband often working far from home, Mrs. La managed the household alone and supplemented income by foraging bamboo shoots. Life was a daily struggle for water and survival.

EMW Laos' WOBA (Women-led Output based aid) project delivered piped clean water to her home. At just 0.19 \$ per cubic meter, the new drastically reduced system her eliminated bottled water costs, and allowed her to spend more time with her children. Her youngest son, Only, now helps eagerly with household chores, enjoying the benefits of clean water.

Mrs. La is one of 128,340 beneficiaries of the WOBA project. Her story demonstrates how clean water transforms daily life, strengthens families, and builds hope for rural communities in Laos.



In Mien Commune, Ou Reang Ov District, Cambodia, Ms. Ean SokNeang has been managing a private water supply station since July 2017, now connecting two communes to safe, reliable water.

Before joining EMW's projects, convincing residents to invest in clean water was a major challenge. Through EMW projects, she received training on Water Safety Plans (WSP) and Menstrual Health and Hygiene (MHH), along with technical and business support that strengthened her operations.


Today, more families have access to clean water, improving health, hygiene, and quality of life. Beyond running her business, Ms. SokNeang supports disadvantaged households and hopes for more training opportunities to help local people gain skills and reduce unemployment—proving how women can drive both social impact and sustainable business in rural water supply.

Ms. SokNeang joins the project team in interviewing a household and guides the family on how to use safe water from her supply station.
